

# January 2022

No one can serve two masters. Either they will hate the one and love the other, or they will be devoted to the one and despise the other. (Mt 6:24)

In between the time of serving as a family minister in an ELCA congregation and becoming a certified pastor of the LCMC, I was a Christian counselor near Des Moines, IA. The journey to Christian counseling began with a letter. I have a Master of Theology degree through Wartburg Theological Seminary and a Master of Counseling degree through Sioux Falls Seminary. In the Summer of 2009 at the ELCA national assembly, the ELCA opened the door to ordination for people in committed long term monogamous same sex relationships. The church I served had two ordained pastors as well as me on their pastoral staff. Following this ELCA vote I wrote a letter to the other pastors stating how this action is against God's Word. Jesus proclaimed marriage is between a man and a woman in Matthew 19:4-6. (Ask an ELCA pastor why Jesus' words of Matthew 19 have no value in the ELCA and you will get an explanation on how we need to interpret those words through the social-historical context of the time in which Jesus was protecting women and not making a statement on marriage.) The lead pastor took this letter as a resignation letter not an opportunity for pastoral discussion. My ministry shifted from bringing healthy systemic family concepts into a church ministry to bringing God's Word into counseling opportunities.

During this two-year counseling experience, I was surprised by how many people I was counseling who were getting out of cult communities. These people were well educated some even had master's degrees. I sought to understand what caused people to be willing to live in a communal community surrendering wealth, personal choices, and blind obedience to a leader. I think this danger for toxic blind obedience is in each one of us. On the way to church this past Sunday, my son Joseph summed up this toxic servanthood hiding behind the idea of freedom. "Freedom is an ideal we all seek. However, we need to be cautious to what gives our freedom. After WWI, German citizens sought freedom from rapid inflation and humiliation. Freedom was offered by the Nazi party. In Russia, people sought freedom from the feudal system of the Tzar. This led to the rise of Communism and one of the bloodiest dictators of all time in Joseph Stalin. When we seek freedom be it from responsibilities, pain, fear, or a ruling party, one needs to consider who offers the freedom." I would add that this misunderstood idea of freedom has to do with the foundational truths by which one lives. Are your foundational truths guided by human knowledge or God's wisdom revealed in the Bible? Sometimes human knowledge seeks to be the base on which Scripture is interpreted. Educated people will use subjective tools like 'social-historical context' to twist Scripture to meet their agendas.

I invite you to seek a truth base that begins in Holy Scripture and is guided by the Holy Spirit. On Wednesday, January 19th through Wednesday, April 6th we will be offering at Wangen Prairie a 12-week discussion on "The Truth Project." The "Truth Project" will seek how we can be Scripture led as we develop a Christian worldview on subjects like: Philosophy, Ethics, Anthropology, Theology, Science, History, Sociology, Law, Community and Service. From 4:30-5:30 my family will gather in the basement for a meal. You are more than welcome to join us for this meal, let Cyndi or me know if you can eat with us. At 5:30 my daughter, Jalie will be in the basement available to babysit any children while their parent(s) participate in the

"Truth Project". From 6-7:30 I will facilitate the "Truth Project" presentation and discussion in the sanctuary of Wangen Prairie.

## reefings

This is **not** the Christmas letter we expected to be writing this year. We expected to be telling you "Everything is much the same as last year: continuing our ministry at First Lutheran in Mitchell, preparing for Christmas services, and looking ahead to 2022."

That all changed on Sunday afternoon, January 10. Heidi's speech became garbled. The right side of her face was drooping. We thought she was having a stroke. We raced to the Mitchell hospital.

At the hospital, a quick CT scan revealed her symptoms were caused by a tumor in her head – another meningioma in the same left-side location as the tumor that almost killed her in 1997.

Heidi was transferred to a Sioux Falls hospital and had surgery to remove the tumor. The tumor had damaged part of her skull, so a titanium plate had to be placed over the large opening in her cranium. The surgery was a success, but Heidi needed about a month of physical therapy & speech therapy (the tumor had compressed the part of her brain most related to speech).

By the end of February, Heidi was happily done with therapy. But Lon noticed the swelling on the left side of her head was increasing rather than decreasing as expected, and Heidi was eating less and sleeping more. Despite her protestations, Lon took her to the neuro-surgical clinic in Sioux Falls. The doctor quickly diagnosed a serious infection and scheduled surgery for the next morning.

The surgery revealed a great deal of infection – both outside and inside of the titanium plate. The plate was removed, and her scalp was stitched back together. Following this surgery, she had to wear a helmet to protect her unprotected brain.

The new plan of action: heavy doses of antibiotics to rid her of the infection. Then a third surgery to insert a piece of biopolymer 3-D printed to exactly fit the opening in her skull.

That surgery was successful; however, Heidi suffered a stroke during surgery. She was unable to talk or move her right hand and arm, but could move her right leg a few inches. She remained hospitalized for 4 more days. She was then transferred in-patient rehab.

Heidi was in the rehab unit for 3 weeks and made good progress working with physical, speech, and occupational therapists. The therapists were impressed with how hard Heidi worked. She never quit. She never said "No more."

She was the kind of patient they dreamed about. When she was discharged in mid-June:

- She could speak some enough to usually make herself understood.
- She was walking with a cane.
- She could move her right arm fairly well, but could not do much with her hand.

In the meantime, while all this was going on...

- We decided to resign from our congregation in Mitchell and retire after 38 years as pastors.
- We bought a Sioux Falls townhome that was still under construction.
- We moved Paul to Sioux Falls.

Fortunately, we had a place to go while we waited for the townhome to be completed: our lake cabin near Cloquet. Heidi started doing rehab three days a week in Cloquet. On off days we did rehab exercises at home and went for walks. By early July, she was no longer using a cane.

(One apparent byproduct of the stroke: Heidi finds Lon to be funnier than in the past. She claims it's "better to laugh than cry," but Lon thinks she is finally able to recognize the full depth of his humor.)

We moved into our townhome on August 31, and Heidi started rehab in Sioux Falls. At this point, her improvements are more incremental – which she finds incredibly frustrating. But the good news is she is still improving! (And after having her head shaved 3 times, her hair is growing back nicely... and white!)

Our kids and their spouses have been incredibly helpful and supportive during these many months. Kara and Dean gave us a special gift of joy when Cailin Meribel Pies was born August 5. She is our fifth grandchild. She has a lot to live up to since all of our grandkids are beautiful and above average in every way.

We are thankful for God's continuing care and for the prayers of thousands!


